## A Thought to Ponder



Volunteers do not necessarily have the time; they just have the heart







Born in Tuscumbia, Alabama, USA, in 1880, Helen Keller developed a

fever at 18 months of age that left her blind and deaf. With the help of an exceptional teacher, Anne Mansfield Sullivan of

with the neip of an exceptional reacher, Affile Maintein Julival of the Perkins School for the Blind, Helen Keller learned sign language and braille. A few years later, she learned to speak. As an adult she became a tireless advocate for people with disabilities. And in 1925, she attended the Lions Clubs International Convention and sne arrenged the Lions Clubs international Convention and challenged Lions to become "knights of the blind in the crusade challenged Lions to

against darkness."

The Lions accepted her challenge and our work ever since has The Lions accepted her chaitenge and our work ever since included sight programs aimed at preventable blindness.

In 1971, the Board of Directors of Lions Clubs International declared that **June 1** would be remembered as Helen Keller Day.

# Helen Keller Day

Helen Adams Keller (June 27, 1880 - June 1, 1968) was an American author, disability rights advocate, political activist and lecturer. She lost her sight and her hearing after a bout of illness when she was 19 months old. She then communicated primarily using home signs until the age of seven, when she met her first teacher and life-long companion Anne Sullivan who taught Keller language, including reading and writing. After an education at both specialist and mainstream schools, Keller attended Radcliffe College of Harvard University and became the first deafblind person in the United States to earn a Bachelor of Arts degree.

Keller was also a prolific author, writing 14 books and hundreds of speeches and essays on topics ranging from animals to Mahatma Ghandi. Keller campaigned for those with disabilities, for women's suffrage, labor rights and world peace.

Keller's autobiography, The Story of My Life (1903), publicized her education and life with Sullivan. It was adapted as a play by William Gibson, and this was also adapted as a film under the same title, The Miracle Worker. Her birthplace has been designated and preserved as a National Historic Landmark. Since 1954 it has been operated as a house museum and sponsors an annual "Helen Keller Day.

She was named one of *Time* magazine's 100 Most Important People of the 20th Century.







# May 16 Meeting

The K-Oaks Clubhouse was overrun with cuteness at our May 16 meeting with a visit from ten amazing puppies and their handlers. All of us were spell bound by the explanations from director Paul Fontaine centering on the extensive training the puppies receive as they prepare for a life as a Guide Dog for the Blind.

The attributes and characteristics of the dog being trained are specific to their intended career helping the visually impaired. Even though the puppies at our meeting were young, they have already learned not to move toward food that is dropped. Why is this important? Those of us with puppies of our own know how quickly a pooch can snatch up anything that falls, convinced that it is miraculously found food. But if a visually impaired person were to drop medication it could become a matter of survival for both the dog and the owner for it not to be ingested by the dog.

All the Puppy Raisers are volunteers who undergo their own training on how to train the puppies. They receive their wards when they are 8 weeks old and will provide the pups with the basic training they

will need to be able to perform as a life changing companion to someone with vision impairment. Things like "go" on demand, crate training, harness use are all part of puppy kindergarten. After completion of the basic training, they graduate to studying how to be "street legal" or comfortable with innumerable real-life situations. For this goal they are trained at the botanical gardens, movie theaters, street scenarios, shopping malls, etc. in once-a-month outings. After a year to a year and a half training they are evaluated for further training based on where they may be stationed. They will then graduate to "college" for additional specific training. Some dogs, though well trained, are determined not to be ideal for the visually impaired and they go through a "career change" and a future as a canine buddy.

The Austin chapter of Puppy Raisers began in February of 2023 with only 9 dogs and now are actively training 17 dogs. See pictures next page.

# Flight of Honor by Kenneth Johnston

On April 21st, I, along with 40 other chosen Veterans of Korea and Vietnam, assembled at the Southwest Terminal at Austin-Bergstrom International Airport to participate in Honor Flight Austin #81 to be led by an ROTC Honor Guard and the Austin PD Pipe and Drum Corps in a parade through the terminal to our gate. Along the way we were met with cheers, thank yous, applause and handshakes. Something most of us had not been used to. As a soldier during a very unpopular war, upon discharge from active duty in 1968, we were met with jeers, protests, rock throwing, cussing, and other disrespectful actions towards us Veterans, at least in California. Never, not once, was I ever thanked for my service to my country. That is until we moved to Texas, and during this 36-hour trip to Washington D.C. and Arlington, VA. When we departed our aircraft, we were met with a double column of young Marines welcoming us to Washington and a crowd in the terminal cheering and applauding us. After a wonderful dinner at our Hilton Hotel, some of us retired to the bar where I was not allowed to buy my own drink. Saturday morning, after a big breakfast, we boarded our 2 buses for a short trip to the Memorials and Arlington Cemetery. Everywhere we went we were met with Thank You's and welcomes. After our tours, and front row at the Changing of the Guard at the Tomb of the Unknown, we boarded our buses for the trip to Reagan National Airport, and then the skies opened up. We departed Washington through Fire Department Water Cannons, as we had in Austin as well. Back at Austin-Bergstrom again we were welcomed with cheers, applause, Thank You's, handshakes, and "Welcome Home". It was an unbelievable trip, "The Trip of a Lifetime", and it was sponsored by Nyle Maxwell Family, their 8th such sponsorship of Honor Flight Austin. Any Veteran of the United States Military that served up to 1975 is eligible for selection. Just go to www.honorflightaustin.org to apply. There is so much more to this story, but time and space limits it. God Bless the United States of America!


# Prayers
