

PULLING TOGETHER



Ken Johnston has provided a great follow-up to his ongoing effort to collect aluminum can pull tabs from our Club and beyond, which he forwards to his blind Lion friend in Chico, CA. Here are some fascinating details and updates as provided by Lion Ken:

It is an ongoing Club Contest in District 4-C1 for the Club with the most tabs (by weight) each Lions Year. More for bragging rights than anything, but the collected tabs are submitted to the Ronald McDonald House in Sacramento and earn enough funds to cover their annual utility costs. I was unaware that some Lions and Leos Clubs up in the Temple-Waco area are doing the same thing for another Ronald McDonald House here in Texas. With my brief tenure with our very own Leos Club, I was fortunate to meet Darie McCleaves, the State Leo Advisor Chair, a retired Army Vet from Temple. When he heard of my requests, he got together with the State Leo Council and they voted to present me with the tabs they had collected. Darie said we could meet somewhere in between, and I could pick them up from him, because he needed them out of his minivan. Our meeting was delayed by both he and his wife's medical conditions (not COVID), so when a weekend popped up that he would be in Georgetown. I drove up to meet him and when he opened the rear hatch I was blown away! Several boxes and bags and jugs full of aluminum pull tabs! We loaded them into my SUV, and I came home, sorted them out of the jugs and

containers and just placed them in garbage bags and then into a couple of cardboard boxes. When Shelly and I weighed them with our health scale, we came up with 135 lbs. total. I shipped FedEx as they were the cheapest (\$241.00) and they would pick them up at our house. When they were delivered 4 days later, Ted, and his brother Tom, along with Glenn and Linda Dunning from their Chico Breakfast Lions Club were blown away. They said it must have cost you a fortune to ship those tabs. I responded, "It was for Charity, and We Serve"

Relationship work - spending time or serving those that are isolated or could use some attention. This could be anything from playing games with elderly or immobilized, reading to kids, serving food for those in need, etc.

Organization work - serving groups in need like the Lions, animal shelters, churches, and other non-profit organizations that need help.

The significant activities of the quarter, in addition to the blood drive, road clean-up, and the on-going administrative activities of the club, include:

1.The trained KidSight Testing team surpassed the number of children previously tested in the last quarter by testing 2,111 during seven (7) sessions at five Liberty Hill schools, , Cedar Park Charter Academy and the LV Elementary school. The core team of six accumulated 226 hours of service performing these tests.

- 2.The BBQ Team served the community by selling their smoked meats prior to Thanksgiving. The 19 members that participated spent 190 hours with preparation, cooking, and packaging of the BBQ meats.
- 3.At the LVPOA Bazaar on November 13th, the Lions again were present to provide breakfast burritos and lunch chicken sandwiches for the vendors and attendees. Twenty Lions members participated with a total of 100 hours of service.
- 4.The crowd at the Lago Vista Tree Lighting event on December 6th were recipients of 1,000 hot dogs prepared and distributed by the Lions team of 20 members working a total of 83 hours.
- 5. Finally, a committee of six members organized and provided the Christmas Dinner and Party for the club's last meeting of the year. Their work totaling 65 hours resulted in a much-appreciated event for all attending.
